Over the past several weeks, I have interviewed many people about how humans are negatively impacting our environment. We met with both of Raven's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Skinner, and Monica Pittman from the Peregrine Fund. Ms. Pittman taught us about how many birds of prey are being affected by DDT. Raven's dad told us about wolverines and how they are being affected by climate change and snowmobiling. Raven's mom told us how animals are being poached for their ingredients to make Chinese medicine. She said that animals' lives are taken and just 1/8 of their body is used. I hope I can make a change on the environment in a good way.

Over the course of Exhibition, I have learned many things from people and organizations in the Treasure Valley. Two of the people I got to meet were Mr. and Mrs. Skinner, who both care deeply about the environment. Mr. Skinner works for the US Forest Service and Mrs. Skinner helps make people feel good about helping the environment. Overall, they taught me about how severe habitat loss is. Another informative experience was with Idaho Rivers United, who hosted a river cleanup at Barber Park. It sadly showed how much people litter. We interviewed Monica Pittman from the Peregrine Fund and she told us all about different species of birds that they have helped breed because they were going extinct. I learned a lot about the northern white rhinos and why there are only two left. I gained so much knowledge from these experiences. Throughout this Exhibition process, I have learned so much about how humans impact the environment. We met with some very awesome people: David Skinner from the Forest Service, Jennifer Skinner who talked to us about the emotional impact on the environment, Ms. Pittman from the Peregrine Fund, and Mr. Brock who is the Sustainability Coordinator here at Riverstone. They all talked about different ways people impact the environment and the different animals that are being harmed. We learned that DDT is affecting the California condors, about wolverines and how their habitats are being harmed, and that in some Chinese medicine, they use small parts of animals for a little medicine.

For the past eight weeks we have interviewed people trying to help defeat global warming. We interviewed Joe, a staff member at the Boise Aquarium. He taught us how lots of people fish illegally and sell parts of fish because they are expensive, or because they taste good. We also watched the documentary 'Chasing Coral' which explained how the corals are dving due to the fact that the ocean is getting warmer every day. We interviewed my mom, Heather Dermott, who is the director of Idaho Business for the Outdoors. Her business is designed to bring companies together to help save our outdoors and public lands. We interviewed Mr. Servheen at Idaho Fish and Game. He used to study caribou to see where they were migrating or if their migrating passage has changed. I have learned a lot about my topic.

During this eight week process, I have learned so much while working with my group and interviewing people in the community that are trying to solve our real-world issue. We went to the Aquarium of Boise where we learned about the two biggest issues the ocean is facing. First of all, coral bleaching because of global warming. If the ocean temperatures rise even just more than two degrees celsius, corals start the first stage of death, also known as bleaching. We learned a lot more about bleaching from the movie 'Chasing Coral.' The second most popular problem is that people still fish for animals in the ocean, even if it's illegal because some animals have things that are very precious or just taste good, so people that don't have money can sell them for a lot. I learned that teamwork is very important during the Exhibition process.

Over the past weeks, I have been studying habitat loss and climate change with Dirck, Sina, and Hadley. We interviewed many people, like Mr. Surveen who works at Idaho Fish and Game. He helps set up the fundraisers to help save animal habitats. We also interviewed Mrs. Dermott. She runs Idaho Business for the Outdoors. She brings businesses together for fundraisers and puts the money into protecting the environment and public lands. I think I learned a lot about climate change and habitat loss and how the community is helping to deal with this big problem. We also learned how we could help by donating and helping with fundraisers, and not littering ourselves. We went to the Sierra Club and talked to Casey Mattoon. He talked to us about what they do to help the environment and the fundraisers they support.

Learning from all these amazing people is something that I won't forget.

She made it very clear that if you shoot an animal and it doesn't die, it is just suffering. You have to chase it down and kill it no matter how much time it takes. My biggest takeaway from all the places we went is you have to be safe with a gun. Everywhere we went, gun laws made a big impact.

COMMUNICATORS

BULLYING

I am currently studying bullying. We have interviewed many great people who gave us a lot of awesome information. We interviewed Mark Neilson, CEO of iGames, and he taught us that cyberbullying is a more important topic than we suspected. We also met with Detective Phan and he taught us that physical bullying can be very bad. We met with Ilana Rubel who made a law about bullying and said people can get bullied even as adults. Some interesting facts that we learned are: 28% of U.S. students in grades 6-12 experienced bullying; 20% of U.S. students in grades 9-12 experienced bullying; 70.4% of school staff have seen bullying; 62% witnessed bullying two or more times in the last month and 41% witness bullying once a week or more.

Over the past weeks, I have been studying and going into the community to talk with people about bullying. I have met with people such as Andrew Fletcher and Ilana Rubel, our district legislator. She thinks that verbal bullying should be legal because of rights and that if it were to be illegal, it would take away a person's right to free speech. One of my big takeaways from meeting with Andrew Fletcher is that he thinks that bullying can be prevented if someone takes a stand for bullying, right when it is happening.
